***New Hampshire is the best state to live, work, and raise a family. Let's keep it that way by investing in quality, affordable health care that saves lives and taxpayer dollars.***

- Medicaid Expansion is the Granite State's opportunity to recapture millions of federal dollars that we have sent to Washington. New Hampshire is a federal donor state, meaning that we pay more in federal taxes than we get back from the federal government. This program brings more than \$400 million dollars back into New Hampshire's economy.
- This program gets people back to work. Of the over 130,000 residents who have accessed critical health care through Medicaid Expansion, only 15,000 have been on the program since inception. Many more beneficiaries got the health care they needed to get healthy and gain employer-sponsored insurance.
- The program supports our workforce and small businesses, providing our low-wage employees with needed access to affordable health coverage, keeping them healthy and working.
- Specific constituencies, such as New Hampshire's former military servicemen and women, are able to rely on Medicaid Expansion for access to care.
