What to Look for in the Data:

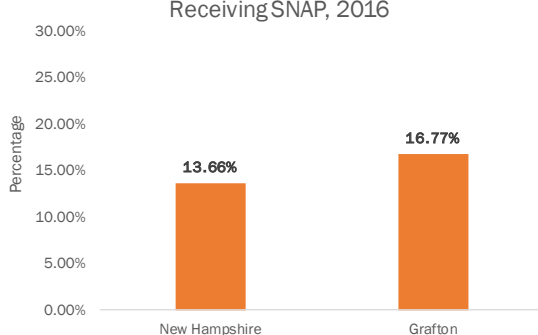
Access to high quality early education helps develop strong social and emotional skills in children setting the stage for future success. In New Hampshire, enrollment in public preschool differs drastically among counties, leading to a gap in opportunity among our young children depending on where they live.

Home visiting programs in New Hampshire can only serve a fraction of those who would benefit due to eligibility and funding restrictions. Home visiting programs are proven to improve maternal and child health outcomes, family economic self-sufficiency, school readiness and reduce child maltreatment.

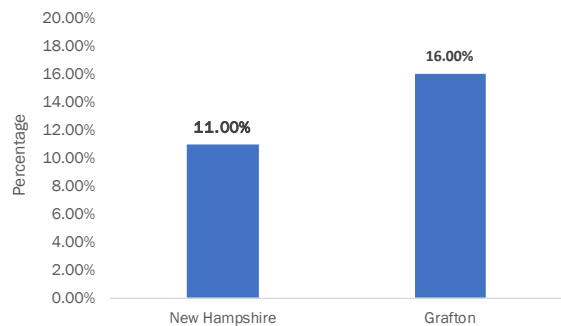
Twenty-three percent of NH adolescents have used marijuana at least once in the last thirty days, which can have long-term, negative impacts on brain development.

Percent of Households with Children Receiving SNAP, 2016



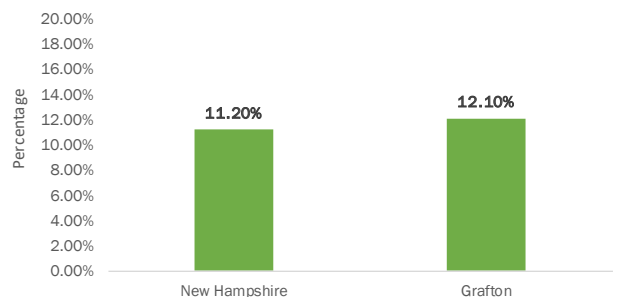
Children in Poverty, 2012-2016



Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Benefits (SNAP, formerly known as food stamps), provides a monthly benefit to eligible households enrolled in the program, enabling participants to purchase food items from authorized vendors.

The EITC is a federal program aimed at encouraging work and subsidizing earnings among low- to middle-income families, particularly those with children, by providing cash in the form of a tax credit.

Policy Recommendations:

Implement a state-funded early education program to ensure access to high quality preschool to all children in New Hampshire.

Expand access to home visiting programs by expanding eligibility and increasing funding to existing programs.

Invest in evidence-informed substance misuse prevention programs to promote adolescent wellbeing and reduce state costs on substance misuse.
